BRAVES FINISH GIANT LEFTY'S CIPHER WORK

Hubbell Runs Streak of Scoreless Frames to 46 and Shatters Ed Reulbach's N. L. Record

Tribe Solve Southpaw's Slants, However, and Randy Moore Drives Two Runs Home in Eighth; Hogan Hits Homer

NEW YORK, Aug. 1 (A. P.).—The Boston Braves put an end to Carl Hubbell's streak of consecutive scoreless innings today when the New York slugger had carried it to a new National League record length, and defeated the league leaders 3 to 1.

Hubbell pitched 5.25 scoreless frames to stretch his string to an even 46 consecutive scoreless innings. Then, with runners on second and third, Randy Moore smashed a single that broke the streak and won the ball game for Boston.

The old National League leader was at home, unharmed by Ed Reulbach, of the Chicago Cubs. Walter Johnson, who holds the all-time record of 58 consecutive scoreless innings, pitched for the Yankees.

Pete Higgins, Hubbell's catcher, hit the home run that broke the streak, and followed the ball hit by the Cubs pitcher. He went on to hit two more, giving only seven hits to the Cubs. The Cubs scored three runs in the sixth and eighth, but the Braves won the game 3 to 1.

Hubbell had given only two hits to the Cubs as he pitched 5.25 scoreless frames in the fourth. Then Bill Crawford and Buster Jordan connected for singles. Walter Dugger fanned and Jordan struck out as Moore swung at a second strike. The Boston pitcher then continued with the next pitch for a new hit and drove in Reulbach.

Reulbach accounted for the only other Boston run by hitting Higgins in the seventh.

Hubbell's streak of 46 consecutive scoreless innings was shattered by Ed Reulbach, of the Chicago Cubs, who hit the home run that broke the streak.
