Cross Nips Wininger on 19th, Wins Title on 17th Try

After 17 attempts and three runner-up roles, 40-year-old Harold (Bub) Cross, Jr., caught up with the Philadelphia Amateur golf championship yesterday at Green Valley Country Club.

Five-foot-eight Harold, a slim 167 pounds, won the grand winner's 19th hole with a hole-in-one that put him ahead of Francis (Bo) Wininger, a stylish player from Oklahoma now playing from Atlantic City CC, for the first time in their match.

Both Cross, from Philadelphia Cricket Club, and Wininger hashed out drives down the left side of the fairway on the 365-yard first hole. With the green opening to the right and the pin well to the left, they had to clear a steeply-banked bunker to get close to the pin.

Cross, slightly away, hit a high wedge shot that hung over the trap for a second, then landed just beyond the apron and rolled up, three inches to the right of the cup. Wininger, forced to play the same daring shot, didn't quite get it. His wedge hit a foot short, dropped back into the trap. That left him with a one-in-a-thousand chance of getting a half by holing from the bunker, and he couldn't bring it off.

ED OVERTIME MATCH

It was the second extra hole match of the day for Wininger (pronounced Wine-ing-ger) who got to the fourth round of this year's British Amateur championship. In the semi-final Bo beat Richmond's Dick Allman there with a par, after Dick had squared the match by rolling in a 10-foot putt on the 18th. Cross, who had eliminated medalist Sam Feneale in the second round, cleared his morning hurdle with a 2 up triumph over John Sussel, White Manor.

Cross won the Philadelphia Amateur title in 1929 and almost every year since then — except for his years in the Army, of which three were spent in Europe in an armored division — has taken a whack at the city title.

BEATEN 3 TIMES

Cliff Boardman beat him the 1932 year, Chris Brinkle in 1933, and Charlie Reckner in 1937. All three were "retired" from tournament golf, but Cross seems untouched by Father Time.

Cross hit to the left of the 15th green, chipped up three feet for a half. He two-putted from 50 feet for his halving par on the 16th.

Cross was short and Winger just over the green in two on the 17th. After both had chipped, Harold missed from eight feet and Bo from four.

On the 18th, both hooked into the rough on their drive. Harold's wood second was short, in the rough to the other side, Bo's iron trickled off the right apron into a trap. Harold chipped 10 feet past the cup, Bo put his shot six feet past — and then both missed again.

Wininger Seeks Phila. Golf Title

PHILADELPHIA district golfers will get their first good look this week at Francis (Bo) Wininger, the young Oklahoman who has played most of his competitive golf in distant parts since moving to Pleasantville, N. J., this spring.

Wininger, representing Atlantic City Country Club, will compete in the Philadelphia Amateur championship, which starts Wednesday at Green Valley Country Club. He'll be one of 77 striving for the title which two-time winner Lincoln Roden will not defend.

Before he was beaten in the fifth round of the British Amateur championship, Wininger had the British golf writers singing his praises.

Wininger returned home just in time to qualify for the National Open at Detroit. He led the amateurs at awesome Oakland Hills until Chuck Kocsis passed him, and U. S. Amateur champion Sam Urzetta tied him at 302, on the last round.

Sussell, Winger Victors; Penecale Loses in City Golf

Sam Penecale had to fight the wind and rain as well as the medalist's jinx yesterday at Green Valley Country Club in the Philadelphia Amateur golf championship, and while he refused to bow to the weather, Harold (Bub) Cross, Jr., finally put him out of the tournament.

Cross, the slender swinger from the Philadelphia Cricket Club, beat Penecale in the second round, 3 and 2, after the Melrose star who had won the qualifying medal with a two-under-par 140, rallied for a 1 up triumph over Arthur Thorner, Jr., Riverton, 1 up.

That put Cross, even par for his two rounds—he beat James J. Jennings, Philadelphia Electric, 6 and 5, in the morning—in today's semi-

final round against Allan Sussell, White Manor.

Sussell defeated Ellis Taylor, Newark, Del., 3 and 1, and then contrived an odd par five—he was in one of the matches which started on the back nine—on the 20th hole to erase Roger Ducceschi, Chester Valley. Sussell curled a 20-footer putt around a partial stymie on the close-out hole.

In the lower bracket Francis (Bo) Winger, the transplanted Oklahoman who now lives at Pleasantville, N. J. and plays from Atlantic City CC, meets Philmont's Dick Allman, like Cross a long-time seeker of the title.

The storm which lashed the Philadelphia district yesterday struck

Green Valley twice, halting play in the first round for an hour and delaying start of the second until 4:25 P. M.

Penecale was 3 down to the left-handed Thorner after 11 holes when the rain and lightning stopped them. Sam had a rest—and a snack meanwhile—and then won the next four holes with three pars and a birdie. They halved the remaining three.

TRAPS TEE SHOT

But Cross, one under par for his afternoon stint on the very wet course, never gave Sam that chance. Penecale evened the match with a birdie on the 12th after being 1 down at the turn, then dropped back on the next hole when he trapped his tee shot and lost it to a par. But the back-breaker for Sam came on the 15th, where Cross, faced by a dead stymie, took a No. 6 iron and chipped over, into the cup, for a winning birdie.

The 28-year-old Winger rolled along in the lower bracket with a 2 up triumph over Sam Robinson, of the host club, and a 6 and 4 victory over clubmate and ex-champion Jack Penrose.

DEADLY PUTTING

Winger, never given a breathing spell by Robinson, started ramming in putts with deadly consistency—he had only 22 for the 14 holes—against Penrose. Bo, one over par in the morning, was even in the afternoon.

Allman's even-par pace beat Don Weiland, Phoenixville, 6 and 5. Then he chipped in for a birdie on the second extra hole to eliminate Clem Undeck, Sandy Run, on the second round where he was two over.

Cross Nips Wininger on 19th, Wins Title on 17th Try

After 17 attempts and three runnerup roles, 40-year-old Harold (Bub) Cross, Jr., caught up with the Philadelphia Amateur golf championship yesterday at Green Valley Country Club.

Five-foot-eight Harold, a slim 140 pounds, won it in the grand manner on the 19th hole with a birdie three that put him ahead of Francis (Bo) Wininger, a stylish swinger from Oklahoma now playing from Atlantic City CC, for the first time in their match.

Both Cross, from Philadelphia Cricket Club, and Wininger bashed long drives down the left side of the fairway on the 365-yard first hole. With the green opening to the right and the pin well to the left, they had to clear a steeply-banked bunker to get close to the pin.

Cross, slightly away, hit a high wedge shot that hung over the trap for a second, then landed just beyond the apron and rolled up, three inches to the right of the cup. Wininger, forced to play the same daring shot, didn't quite get it. His wedge hit a foot short, dropped back into the trap. That left him with a one-in-a-thousand chance of getting a half by holing from the bunker, and he couldn't bring it off.

2D. OVERTIME MATCH

It was the second extra hole match of the day for Wininger (pronounced Wine-ing-ger) who got to the fourth round of this year's British Amateur championship. In the semi-final Bo beat Philmont's Dick Allman there with a par, after Dick had squared the match by rolling in a 10-foot putt on the 18th. Cross, who had eliminated medalist Sam Penecale in the second round, cleared his morning hurdle with a 2 up triumph over Allan Sussel, White Manor.

Cross won the Philadelphia Junior title in 1929 and almost every year since then — except for his five in the Army, of which three were spent in Europe in an armored force division — has taken a whack at the city title.

BEATEN 3 TIMES

Griff Boardman beat him the 1932 final, Chris Brinkle in 1933, and Charlie Reckner in 1937. All three have "retired" from tournament golf, but Cross seems untouched by Father Time.

From the standpoint of scoring, both Cross and Wininger played their poorest golf of the tournament in the final with five-over-par 76s. A putter colder than cafeteria soup — he had 35 putts for the round, seven times taking two from 10 feet or less — beat Bo. Cross with 31 putts, wasn't sensational, but he got the ball close enough to one-putt five times.

They were all even at the turn, halving everything going out except the sixth, which Cross lost when he three-putted, and the eighth, on which both missed the green but Harold pitched up for his par.
