

Veteran Hutchison Ends Jinx, Wins Phila. Open Golf by 3 Strokes on 142

After many years of futile effort, Ralph Hutchison, veteran pro from Brookhaven, Mass., today won the Philadelphia Open golf championship with a 36-hole score of 142 that matched par for the testing Tuxedo-Park-Edgemoor CC course yesterday.

Splitting the fairways with long booming drives and putting as if a magnet was luring the ball to the green, Hutchison hit the crown by firing a one-under par 70 in the afternoon after putting a one-over 72 in the morning.

THREE AHEAD
He finished three strokes to the good in taking the top prize of \$150 from a cluster of 114 that included four 180s ranging area champions and just about every top-flight champion in Delaware Valley, USA.

Although Hutchison has been a quarter-finalist in the National PGA tour, this marked the first time he was able to secure a major title in tournament competition. His previous success had been in the Lady-Pin tournament when he had won it in 1931.
