Hyndman's 139 Wins Medal in City Golf

William Hyndman, 3d, of Huntingdon Valley, played with the steadiness and finesse that one would expect from a brand new member of the U.S. Walker Cup team as he shot two sparkling sub par rounds of golf for a 36-hole score of 139 to win the medal in qualifying play for the Philadelphia amateur championship tournament at Cedarbrook CC yesterday.

Hyndman, second low amateur in the recent National Open and runnerup for the National Amateur crown two years ago, finished the hot afternoon with a

The Wedges Ball, Surface

Dick Stephens, Aromink, faced a quandary when his approach shot on the 18th buried itself beneath the putting surface in the morning round of qualifying in the Philadelphia amateur yesterday.

Under USGA rules, players were not permitted to lift a ball for cleaning purposes and the tourney committee had made no special provisions for such an unusual situation.

Stephens used a wedge for his third shot instead of a putter. He blasted the ball 15 feet past the pin and a chunk of fine putting surface went with it. He quickly replaced the turf and, despite considerable mud on the ball, managed to putt home in two strokes for a 73.

A playoff for the final position was forced when Francis Donohue, of Philadelphia Electric, posted the final card of 77-76—153. William T. Walsh, Philadelphia Country Club, birdied the first hole—he placed an eight-iron second shot within a foot of the pin—to win the playoff from Ray McCabe, Philadelphia Electric, after each had posted 156s. It was a headbreaker for the latter, who thought he was under the wire after sinking a 30-foot putt on his final hole of regulation play.

SIX CRACK PAR

No less than six players broke par on at least one round. Ned Vane, former Yale captain and son of Mrs. Glenna Collett Vane, former national champion, had the hottest short spur of the day when he birdied six holes on the back nine for a four-under 32 as he posted a second round 70 for a lie at 147.

TEENAGER QUALIFERS

One of the surprise performers was 17-year-old Bucky Erhardt, Dupont-Pennsgrove, who qualified at 154, although he failed to qualify for the recent junior tournament. In contrast William H. Care, the newly crowned junior champion from Atlantic City, never came close. He had a 167.

Other members of the young set who qualified were William (Buck) Hyndman, 4th, 17-year-old son of the medalist, who had 150, and Joe Lewis, Villanova senior, and son of pro Bud Lewis, who was among those tied at 147. SIX BIRDES

It was the second straight year and third time in four years that the senior Hyndman won the medal and, in contrast to the triumphs of his previous triumphs were quite as brilliant.

Everitt and Hyndman Lead Advance To Phila. Amateur Golf Quarterfinal

Defending champion Howard Everitt, of Atlantic City, and medalist William Hyndman, 3d, of Huntingdon Valley, led the way into the quarterfinal round of the Philadelphia Amateur championship golf tournament with a pair of impressive victories at Cedarbrook Country Club yesterday. But the major thrills in a perfect sunny day crammed with interesting, sparkling shotmaking were produced by one of the vanquished.

Edwin C. (Ned) Vare, former Yale University golf captain playing out of Philadelphia Country Club, extended former champion John Dyniewski, of White-marshal and current Pennsylvania amateur king, to the 22d hole in the big spine tingler.

MARATHON MATCH

This marathon, decided by Dyniewski's par five on the fourth extra hole after his opponent took a bogey after hooking his drive into a cluster of trees and missing the green with his third shot, came after Vare battled 21 holes before sidetracking young Francis Donohue, Philadelphia Electric, in the morning first round.

The 22-year-old Vare, son of Mrs. Glenna Collett Vare, former six-time National champion, ended the gruelling morning test with a par four, gained by two-putting off the fringe 80 feet away.

HEADED FOR UPSET

Vare appeared on the way to an upset similar to the one he scored over Hyndman at Merion in 1954 when he birdied the 12th and 13th in the afternoon to take a 1 up lead on Dyniewski, winner of the tourney in 1955 and 1954.

But Dyniewski, former Temple University captain, promptly squared the match with a birdie three on the 14th. Both birdied the 15th and then they matched pars the rest of the way.

SINKS LONG PUTT

Dyniewski had to sink a 12-foot putt on the 17th to get his par against a two-footer by Vare after both missed the green. Dyniewski muffed a chance to end it on the first extra hole when he missed a putt from four-feet, but the next time opportunity knocked he wasn't found wanting.

Everitt Triumphs In City Title Golf

George Rowbotham, of Aronimink and Dick Allman, of Philmont—weren't as fortunate.

Rowbotham was put out quickly by Hyndman, 6 and 5, in a morning match that the former described "like running into a buzzsaw." Hyndman, second low amateur in this year's National Open and runnerup in the National Amateur two years ago, also registered a routine 3 and 2 decision over John Fraser, of Whitmarsh, in the afternoon.

OVERTIME MATCH

Allman survived a 19-hole morning match with Chester Valley's Henry J. McQuiston, Jr., but was sidetracked by John Hendrickson, Philadelphia Cricket, 3 and 2, in the afternoon.

Hyndman, one of the new members of the U. S. Walker Cup team, gained a 4 up lead on Rowbotham on the front nine, and ended the match when he dropped a 25-foot putt for a birdie four on the 512-yard 12th. In the afternoon he was 1 up at the turn, 3 up after the first two holes of the back nine, but bogeys on the 12th and 15th delayed his triumph until the 16th, which he won with a par.

Everitt was one over par as he disposed of fellow clubmate Anthony DeSimone, 4 and 2, in the first round, and then took a 2 and 1 verdict from Stanley Nolan, Sandy Run, after lunch.

WEILAND LOSES

The champion will be challenged this morning by James Ginsberg, 23-year-old former Penn State athlete from Ashbourne, who defeated Aronimink's Don Weiland, 2 and 1, and Springhaven's Ken Risko, 1 up. The latter put out young Billy Hyndman, 4th, in the first round. Sam Maniaci, Cedarbrook's Club champion who was runnerup to the senior Hyndman in the qualifying round advanced by romping over Guy Bates, of Merion, 6 and 5, and Louis Riggs, Jr., North Hills, 6 and 4. He ended the latter match by firing successive birds on the 12th, 13th and 14th.

He'll be opposed today by Riverton's Bob Morris; who scored a 2 up victory over Tom Conboy, Whitmarsh, before upsetting clubmate Bob Beirne, South Jersey amateur champion 2 and 1.

Dick Stephens, Aronimink, earned the right to challenge Dyniewski when he bowled over young Bucky Erhardt, DuPont-Pennsgrove, 4 and 3, and eked out a 2 and 1 decision over the Whitmarsh's Bill Robinson.

Everitt Retains Crown, Beats Dyniewski, 3 and 2

'Tis said that no champion is worth his salt unless he repeats. Howard Everitt, the handsome 41-year-old redhead from Atlantic City CC proved emphatically that he is most worthy of the ruler's ermine when he retained his Philadelphia Amateur golf championship with a 3 and 2 conquest of Johnny Dyniewski, the state amateur champion from Whitmarsh Valley, at Cedarbrook CC yesterday.

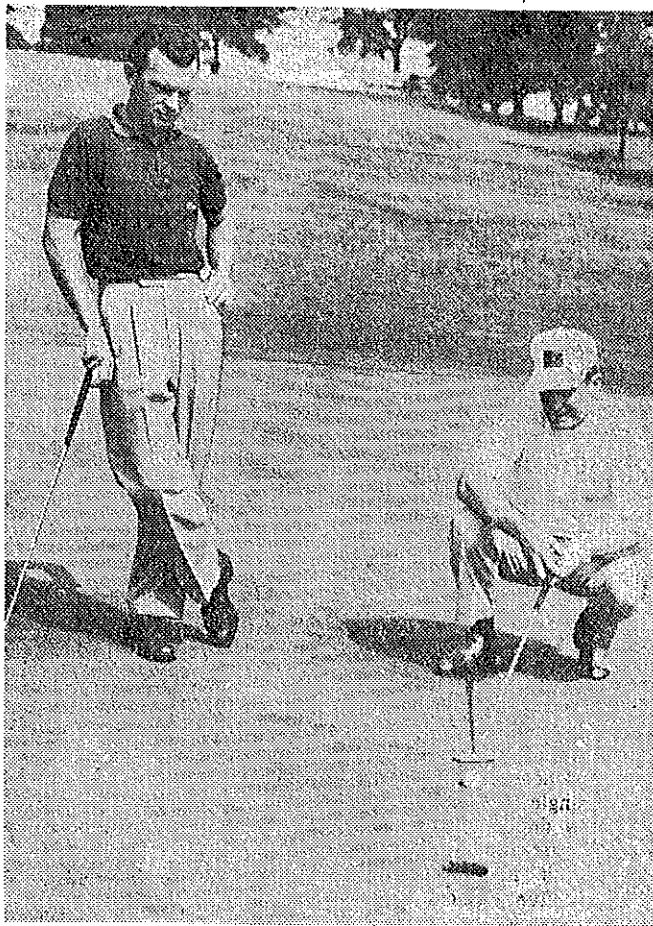
It was a most tasty triumph for Everitt, a one-time caddie at Manufacturer's who is now national sales manager for a distilling firm, as it avenged his defeat in his only previous match-play encounter with Dyniewski in the Pennsylvania State Amateur final at Merion last year.

DRIVES INTO PINES

Everitt, who took the lead for keeps on the 17th, was even with par for the match which he ended by rolling home an eight-foot putt for a par on the 34th, which Dyniewski bogied as a result of washing his drive into a clump of pine trees off the right fairway.

Everitt hooked his drive into the left rough on the 34th, but whereas Dyniewski was forced to be content to get his second back on the fairway, the champion came through with a tremendous No. 2 iron between trees that left him on the fringe of the green.

Dyniewski's third shot rolled to the back fringe. He made a great try on a downhill curving putt, but it skipped past the lip and stopped two feet beyond. Everitt was strong with his putt from the front fringe, but was true on the return putt. It had scarcely hit the cup when Dyniewski bounded across the green to congratulate the Northfield, (N. J.,) resident.

FORCED TO RALLY

It brought to an end four days of exciting golf in one of the most entertaining tournaments in the association's history. While neither finalist was able to duplicate his hot play of the semifinals, when both were under par, the gallery of some 1500—largest to watch the climax in memory of the oldest association official—was treated to plenty of excellent shots.

Everitt was the longer and straighter hitter from the tees and more accurate with his approach shots, yet had to come from behind to win. He was two down at the turn of their morning round as a result of Dyniewski firing birds on the fourth and ninth.

However, Everitt bogied only the fourth and wound up one under par for the first 18 when he tallied birds on the 14th and 15th. This put him even in the match and when Dyniewski pulled his drive under the trees on the 17th, Everitt was able to take the lead with a par and stay there.

Everitt went 3 up when he sank birdie putts of eight and 16 feet, respectively, on the 20th and 21st. But Dyniewski came back strong to win the 22d and 24th where he dropped putts of six and 12 feet, respectively, for birds.

NEEDS EXTRA STROKE

Most everyone conceded the match to Everitt when the 30-year-old Dyniewski, winner of the tourney in 1955-54 and runnerup in 1952, sliced his second shot into trees on the right on the 27th. He hit two trees getting out and needed an extra stroke before finding the green. He conceded the hole when Everitt put his third within 12 feet.

But Everitt gave him an opening by missing his second shot on the 30th and knocking his third over the green, giving Johnny the hole easily with a conceded two-foot birdie putt.

DROPS 25-FOOT PUTT

On the 31st Dyniewski, now only one down, rammed home a 25-foot putt for a birdie three, but Everitt also produced a birdie with a six-foot putt. After the match, both players claimed this was the decisive hole.

Henry McQuiston, Chester Valley, won the President's Cup when he walloped Billy (Buck) Hyndman, 4th, Huntingdon Valley, 10 & 9 in the finals of play among the first round losers.
