Beirne's 145 Takes City Amateur Medal

Robert (Beetle) Beirne, veteran Riverton linksman who insists he's a has-been at age 39, and John Dyniewski, Whitmarsh ace, shared the spotlight in the 36-hole qualifying round for the annual Philadelphia Amateur golf championship tournament at the Philmont CC Tuesday.

Beirne, slim, wiry former South Jersey Open and Amateur

champion, was the only contestant able to break par on the tight, demanding 6430-yard North Course and took the medal with 145.

Beirne overcame a stretch of putting woes on the first round to fire a one-under-par 36-33—69 in midafternoon, after carding 35-41—76 in the morning.

He finished two strokes ahead of Tavistock's Ed Wallace, East-

ern Intercollegiate champion while captain at Penn several years back, and Francis Nixon, former Olney athlete and an ex-Interscholastic champion playing out of Sandy Run. Both tallied rounds of 72 and 75.

Dyniewski, two-time City champion and runnerup to Bill Hyndman, 3d, last year, finished four strokes off the pace with 73-76—149, but this tally added to his Patterson Cup score of 150 gave him the coveted Silver Cross at 299.

SCORE OF 156 NEEDED

Wayne Bancroft, Tavistock, who won the Patterson Cup with 147, qualified for Wednesday's first round of match play at 154 and finished in a second-place Silver Cross tie at 301.

A score of 156 was needed to qualify for match play for the crown Hyndman is not defending.

Among the "Old Guard" who failed to make the grade were Philmont's Dick Allman, one of three former champs in the field; Aronimink's Don Weiland, semifinalist last year; Whitmarsh's Bill Robinson, and Jack Binswanger, North Hills.

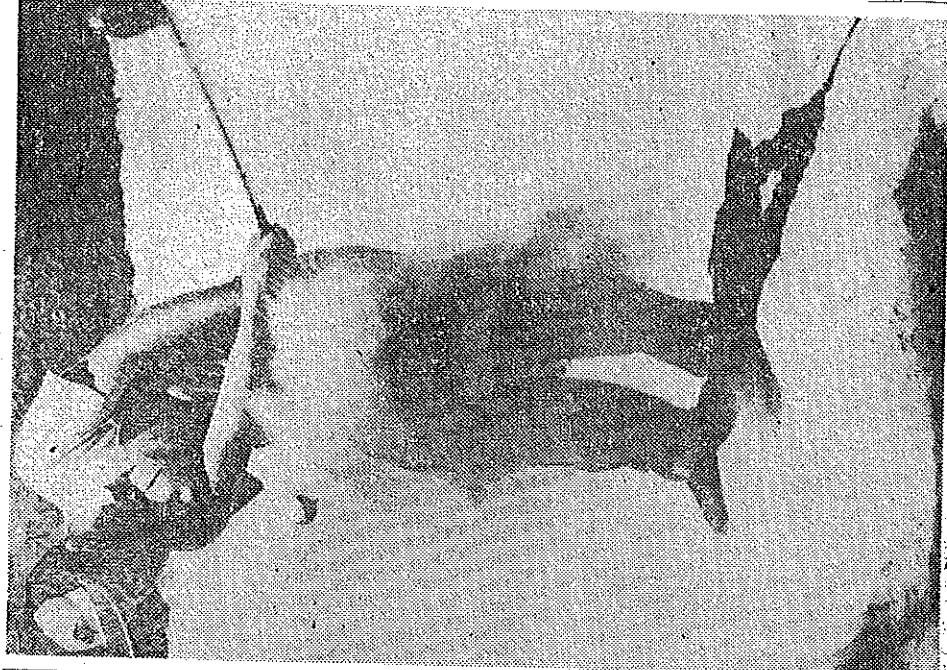
ROWBOTHAM HAS 151

Maniaci to Test Dyniewski in Phila. Amateur

It was Johnny Dyniewski against the field after the smoke of battle had lifted following the first two rounds of match play in the City Amateur Championship Golf Tournament at the Philmont CC Wednesday.

As expected, the 33-year-old Whittemarsh Valley representative led the way into the quarterfinals with two decisive victories, although his play was not quite up to par.

Dyniewski, City ruler in 1954 and 1955 and runnerup in the tournament the past two seasons, bowled over Larry Feldman, Philmont, 3 and 2, and downed former champion George Rowbotham, Aronimink, 3 up.

BEIRNE IS UPSET

He'll be challenged Thursday morning by Cedarbrook's Sam Maniaci, one of two 47-year-olds who qualified for match play. The latter upset medalist Robert Beirne, of Riverton, on the 20th hole with his first birdie of the tourney, and eliminated young Paul Erhardt, Jr., of Buena Vista, 5 and 4.

This is the second time Maniaci, a member of Columbia's Rose Bowl football team and now head of a midcity photographic firm, has advanced to this stage of the tourney. He's hoping to avenge a second-round defeat he received at the hands of Dyniewski last year.

"I'll have a good chance to do it, if I play as I did in the afternoon," beamed Maniaci, who was one-under-par in his match with Erhardt, but who trailed all the way and twice was two-down before overcoming the favored Beirne with a 12-foot birdie putt on the second extra hole of his morning test.

SCRAMBLED AROUND

Dyniewski would have been the first to agree with him as he was far from pleased with all the scrambling he did in his second-round match.

Dyniewski matched par against Feldman, but was four over in knocking Rowbotham out of contention for the third time in the tournament's history.

John overcame a hole deficit in the latter match by winning

the 14th, 15th and 16th with pars. Rowbotham reduced the edge to a single hole when he won the short 17th with a par as John caught a trap. But George conceded the 18th after his second shot, made from a bad spot under trees at the left, went over the green and out of bounds.

Al McQuiston, former Penn star from Chester Valley, and Connie Campbell, Torresdale-Frankford, shared the warm day's spotlight with the veterans.

A public links golfer since his caddie days at Manufacturers, Campbell's only previous tournament experience came in a pro-member event as a partner of Al MacDonald, former pro at Langhorne where Campbell did most of his playing until he took out a junior membership at Torresdale-Frankford last year.

REAL DARK HORSE

Several players, among them J. Wood Platt and Chris Brinke, won the city title in their first appearance in the 62-year-old tourney, but none was such a dark horse as the 6-foot, dark-haired, handsome Campbell.

No one was more thrilled over Connie's conquest than his older brother, The Rev. William Campbell, who had hopes of becoming a top-flight golfer while working for Bud Lewis, Manufacturers pro, before he decided to enter the priesthood.

"I've realized one of my dreams through my brother," said the happy priest as he hurried to congratulate Connie when the latter ended the match with a par on the 32d hole.

TAKES LEAD ON 13TH

Campbell, who was one down to his 19-year-old opponent on four different occasions during the morning round, never trailed after he succeeded in going 1 up with a par on the 13th, where Lindinger had one of his two three-putt greens for a bogey five.

Possibly the most decisive stroke of the match came on the 15th, where Campbell, reading the tricky green perfectly, stroked home a curving downhill 25-foot putt for a birdie three that put him 2 up. It gave him whatever extra confidence he might have needed, and surely had a depressing effect on his rival.

Connie, a draftsman for a Paoli electronics firm, was 3 up at the end of the first 18, after winning the 17th with a par and carding 38-38-74, four over par, for the round.

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The youngster, who had gotten off to a spectacular start by holing a 125-yard wedge shot for a birdie three on the first hole, lost the 19th and 22d to Campbell's par. That gave Connie a 5 up lead and Lindinger was able to win but two holes thereafter and never was closer than four down.

"I never thought I had a chance when I entered the tournament," said the somewhat dazed Campbell, who birdied only two holes but who had only one three-putt green. "Monkeys kept falling out of the trees all afternoon and here I am—in up in the clouds."

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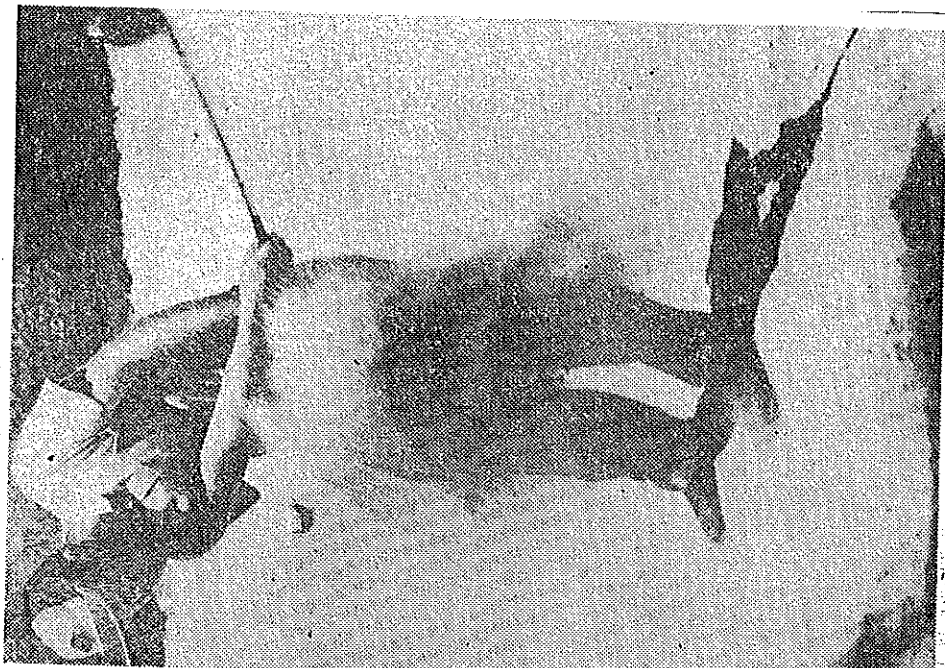

Possibly the most decisive stroke of the match came on the 15th, where Campbell, reading the tricky green perfectly, stroked home a curving downhill 25-foot putt for a birdie three that put him 2 up. It gave him whatever extra confidence he might have needed, and surely had a depressing effect on his rival.

Connie, a draftsman for a Paoli electronics firm, was 3 up at the end of the first 18, after winning the 17th with a par and carding 38-38-74, four over par, for the round.

LINDINGER ERRATIC

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The youngsters, who had gotten off to a spectacular start by holing a 125-yard wedge shot for a birdie three on the first hole, lost the 18th and 22d to Campbell's 18. That gave Connie a 5 up lead and Lindinger was able to find two but two holes thereafter and never was closer than four down.

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Lindinger Upsets Maniaci; Plays Campbell in Final

A 27-year-old former caddie playing in his first tournament, and a 19-year-old collegian set the stage Thursday for a dramatic showdown for the City Amateur Golf Championship at the Philmont CC Sunday. Cornelius (Connie) Campbell, draftsman for

an electronics firm who did all his playing on public links until a year ago, reached the 36-hole final by scoring a 2 and 1 victory over Louis C. Riggs, Jr., of Manufacturers CC. Ironically, Campbell learned his first golf toting bags at Manufacturers while a student at Northeast Catholic High School.

Robert Lindinger, former City and State Junior champion from St. Davids became an unexpected finalist when he upset 47-year-old Sam Maniaci, Cedarbrook, 3 and 1.

NOTABLE CONQUEST

This was quite a notable conquest as Maniaci had ousted former two-time champion Johnny Dyniewski, the favorite from Whitmarsh Valley, in a 6 and 4 quarterfinal stunner.

Maniaci, oldest player in the tourney and also conqueror of medalist Bob Beirne in a first-round upset, had a severe let-down after playing two-under-par golf against Dyniewski and never was in serious contention against his youthful long-hitting opponent.

Lindinger, No. 3 on Duke's golf team as a sophomore this year, also led all the way in eliminating Malcolm Strow, Temple University assistant freshman football coach and club champion at Oak Terrace, 3 and 1, in his morning round.

CAMPBELL RALLIES

Despite Lindinger's fine golf and youthful appeal, it was the "unknown" Campbell who caught the fancy of the galleryites, especially after he fought back spectacularly from four down to spill Tavistock's Wayne Bancroft, a former South Jersey amateur king and winner of the Patterson cup this year, 1 up, in a quarterfinal thriller.

The dark-haired Campbell, handsome, single and nerveless, joined Torresdale-Frankford CC as a junior member last summer at the behest of friends so he'd be eligible to test his skill in district tournaments. He finally got his chance when he found his day off coincided with the City qualifying round.

He easily made the grade with a 36-hole medal score of 149 and thus was forced to take "sick leave" from his job at Paoli in

Valley's Sam Robinson, 4 and 3.

Campbell, son of a bricklayer, had only one birdie on Thursday's morning round, and wasn't able to get the lead on Bancroft, a former Princeton captain, until the short 17th, which he parred as the pudgy Tavistock linksman missed the green and took a bogey four. This made it possible for a win on the 18th where both took bogey fives.

Campbell had only one birdie in the afternoon against Riggs. He made it with a 12-foot putt on the sixth to go two up and never trailed thereafter, although Riggs, a Jenkintown auto salesman and a former Penn State athlete, twice cut the margin to a single hole.

GRABS 4-UP LEAD

Lindinger, whose most enthusiastic rooters were his parents and brothers, Dick and Tommy, was simply too straight and steady for Maniaci as he roared off to a four-up lead after seven holes and then held on with grim poker-faced concentration.

"The kid" was just one over par on the front nine, but was seven over for the match. Maniaci, who lost his touch completely, was six over after nine, 10 over for the match, but managed to cut the difference to two holes before he lost the 17th to Lindinger's par. The latter birdied only the seventh, where he canned a 10-foot putt.

Campbell Routs Lindinger In City Golf Final, 5 and 4

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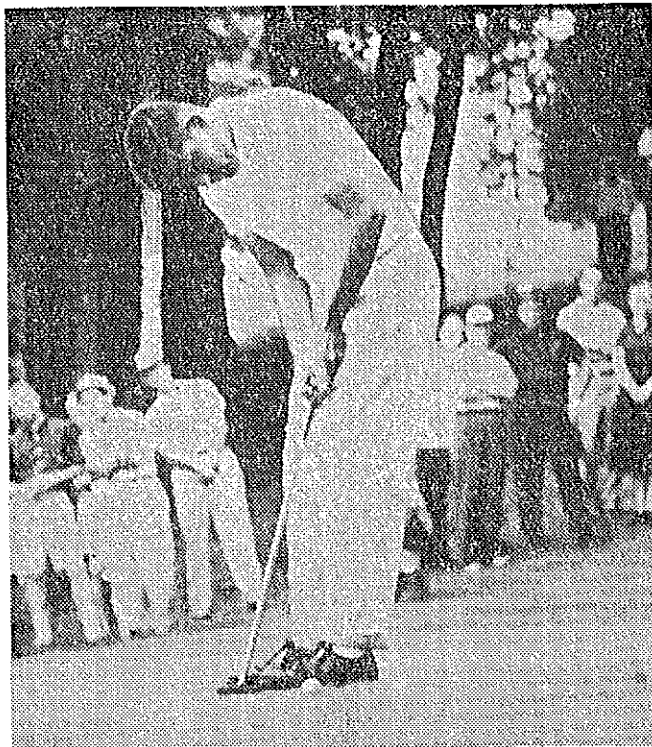
