Hitting the 6334-yard Torresdale-Frankford Country Club course for two rounds of subpar golf, Don Norbury, the medalist from Wildwood G and CC, reached the quarter-final round of the 71st Philadelphia Amateur golf championship Wednesday.

In the morning Norbury, 1959 and 1960 Eastern intercollegiate champion from Penn, was three-under par as he eliminated young Tom Eiman, of Huntingdon Valley, 6 and 5, and in the afternoon was four under as he defeated former City ehampion Jack Hendrickson, of Philadelphia Cricket, 4 and 3.

Among other prominent golfers reaching the quarter-finals were Gordon Brewer, Huntingdon Valley, medalist last year; Harvey Smith, veteran from Atlantic City CC; Paul Erhardt, 3d, Sakima CC, and Jay Sigel, State champion from Bala GC.

DRIVES IMPROVE

Norbury, who will meet Brewer Thursday, said he started hitting his drives more accurately on the second nine of his morning round against Eiman and continued to do so against Hendrickson.

Norbury was two up after nine against Hendrickson. He won the first with a par as Hendrickson missed his tee shot. He birdied the second with a 15-footer as Jack barely missed a similar putt. After they halved the next three holes. Hendrickson birdied the sixth to cut the lead as Don missed a 20footer.

Don boosted the lead to two again with two fine wood shots to the seventh for a par. Jack again cut the lead to one with a bird on the 10th, hitting the par-five hole in two and going down in two putts.



Norbury Ousted

"Look at yesterday," continued the Huntingdon Valley player, "I beat Don Norbury in the morning. He was seven under par in the first two rounds and played two over against me.

oùt." Brewer's clash with Norbury fit the "exciting" mold as did most of yesterday's. Wednes day's sub-par performances were not repeated, but the cali-ber of golf did not diminish and this year's matches have been the most hotly contested in years.

A frail looking 140-pounder who stands 5-10, Stevenson plays a strong game off the tee. He is a streak putter who gives opponents fits and was the youngest lad to make the semis in years.

Smith has long been one of the best shotmakers in the district and perhaps the finest long iron player, as he proved on the lengthy back nine par threes. But he pin-pointed one facet for his showing: "I'm putting better."

Sigel agreed. The State Amateur titlist from Aronimink made the turn even with par and 3-up. But Smith had lost a ball in the ninth bunker, and the hole, got charged.

Smith Surprises Sigel

Smith birdied the 10th and after three halving pars he struck again. Needing only a six-foof putt for a bird on the 212-yard 14th, Sigel was surprised when Smith ran home a 23-footer for a two. Sigel then missed.

Smith plays out of Atlantic City CC, but the former Cres-centville resident is more familiar with Torresdale-Frankford CC than Brewer, of Huntingdon Valley CC.

Until 1959 Smith was a public links player and was based at the old Holmesburg course im-mediately south of Torresdale-Frankford. He played in many invitations at the par 34-36-70 layout north of Grant av. before joining the country club circuit.

Knows His Way

"I know one thing about the course," Smith said yesterday. "Distance isn't the most important thing. You've got to keep the ball in play and be able to maneuver it into the greens to score."

A native of Winston-Salem, N. C., Brewer has lived in this area less than eight years. In his matches this week he played the 6,334-yard course like a life-long member.

"I think it's a wonderful match play course," said Brewer, 30-year-old assistant bank "It's just a vice president. pleasure to play on such a wellconditioned course."

Smith and Brewer have much in common. Both are in the final for the first time; both have vet to win a major title; both play steady golf-but in different styles.

50-year-old retired Smith, Philadelphia fireman, maintains a cool appearance. No matter how his match is going, his manner is unchanged and he rarely speaks. He putts almost casually.

Brewer is more expressive, although he is far from a showboat. He studies his shots intensely. His conversations with his caddie and spectators is courtly in the best Southern tradition.
