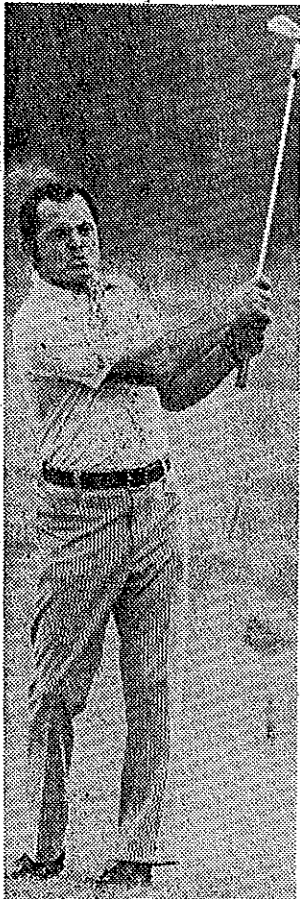

Sigel Accelerates, Wins Patterson Cup By 2 Shots on 144

... defender in trouble

Jay Sigel, 28-year-old insurance executive from Berwyn representing Aronimink Country Club, "speeded" up his game to regain the prestigious Patterson Cup with a 36-hole par-equaling 144, Wednesday at the Whitford CC.

Sigel, three-time state champion and winner of the Patterson Cup at Merion in 1970, won by two strokes over Barry Bowen, a newcomer to the area from Philadelphia Electric, and Ernie Eichenberg, Chester Valley.

IN HIS FIRST ROUND, Sigel bogeyed the first hole and birdied the ninth, while parring the others. On that first hole it took him four to reach the green.

On his second round, in which he went out in one under 35 and returned in 37, Sigel garnered four birds to compensate for four bogeys.

His birds came on the first with the help of a 12 foot putt; the short fifth, when his No. 9 iron missed a hole-in-one by six inches; the ninth with a three-footer and the 12th, where a good drive and long iron left him with two putts.

"I'M A DELIBERATE golfer," said Sigel, who played in his first 36-hole set of the season, "But in this tournament I increased the tempo, perhaps getting a bit more rhythm.

"I feel the speed-up has helped me tune up my game. I've been practicing a lot and am satisfied with my play today."

The best individual round was turned in by Eichenberg, 33-year-old sales engineer, who shot a second-round, four-under-par 68 after a six-over first round of 78.

IN POSTING HIS 68, Eichenberg birdied the fifth with a 15-footer; the ninth, where he just missed an eagle from five feet; the 12th, with a 20-footer; the 15th with a four-foot putt, and the 16th, when a nine-iron left him less than a foot away.

Bowen, who came here from Pittsburgh, tied with Tom Sine of Trenton CC for the first-round lead at 71.
